Five Resolutions for a Safer 2011

1. Torture your kids by talking to them seriously about their safety. Resolve to sit down with your children — no matter their age — and talk with them about their own personal safety. If they're young, teach them to check first before they go anywhere with anyone. (Because strangers aren't the only people who can harm a child.)

If they're older, talk to them about online predators, "sexting," bullying, drinking, and other relevant safety topics for adolescents and teens. For more information about these subjects, contact your child's school resource officer, school counselor or contact the Sheriff's Office.

2. Your home is your castle, so raise the drawbridge. In 2011, whether you're at home, running an errand, or vacationing in another country, resolve to keep your doors and windows closed and locked. This simple habit is one of the best crime-prevention methods out there ... and it's free! Don't forget about your garage door — it's one of the easiest ways for thieves to access your property.

Your car is probably the most valuable of your belongings, so why treat it differently than your house? Keep your car's windows up and doors locked, whether it's parked in the garage, in the driveway or on the street. Never leave your purse, wallet or other valuables inside. Never leave the keys inside, and never leave it running without you in it. Even in your own driveway.

3. Don't abuse drugs or alcohol. The abuse of alcohol, prescription drugs and illegal drugs is linked to crime and quality-of-life issues of all kinds. Our deputies have seen these factors contribute to car crashes, domestic arguments and abuse, and child abuse. Intoxication also compromises the ability to escape a dangerous situation — it is often a factor in sexual assaults.

Untold numbers of criminals have told us that addiction to drugs was the driving force behind the identity thefts, auto thefts, robberies and related crimes they've committed.

If you think you may have a problem with alcohol or drugs, the best New Year's resolution you can make is to get help.

4. Trust no one. Okay, that's a bit much. But after seeing the "Grandma, I Need Money" phone scam, we wouldn't mind if you started asking your own grandkids for identification.

What we mean is: make a resolution to verify the recipient before donating money or sharing personal financial information. If someone comes to your front door selling something as a fund-raiser, take the company's information and say you'll follow up after researching it. Do not let a stranger inside your house to use the restroom, or for any other reason.

If you get an e-mail, phone call or text message that appears to be from your bank or credit union, contact the bank separately using the number on your statement. Be savvy and skeptical about any incoming correspondence from financial institutions. Your bank will not request personal information from you by phone or e-mail — not even for "verification." When in doubt, delete.

5. Stay informed. Knowledge is power. One of the best ways you can bolster your own safety is to stay informed about crime trends affecting your community. The mainstream news media is one valuable source. But did you know you can also sign up to receive crime updates or register your cell phone to receive emergency notifications through the Douglas County Sheriff's Office web site?

Resolve to sign up for e-mail alerts on crime and quality-of-life issues by visiting our web site and registering with CrimeReports. You can get crime trend and sex offender information from the online crime map. Also, you can view our monthly crime stats and view media releases online.

Citizens Police Academy Now Accepting Applications



Have you ever thought about what it would be like to be a law enforcement officer? Have you ever wondered if what you see on CSI is real? Have you ever wanted to know how your tax dollars were spent in relation to the Sheriff's Office? Or have you considered becoming a volunteer for your local law enforcement agency?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, you are just the person we want to attend our Citizen's Police Academy. The Douglas County Sheriff's Office, in partnership with the Roseburg Police Department, is inviting all citizens who live or work in Douglas County, and are at least 18 years old, to apply for our 2011 Citizens Police Academy. Many dedicated citizens have taken this opportunity to learn more about our agency and gained a better understanding of the many challenges facing law enforcement in today's society. This would be a great opportunity for you to join that group!

Classes run from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm - in Roseburg - on Thursdays, starting on March 31. Class participants will learn about almost all aspects of the Sheriff's Office and will have face time with the decision and policy makers of the Sheriff's Office. Some of the topics covered by CPA instructors include: patrol procedures, criminal investigations, civil process, law enforcement training, emergency preparedness, drug enforcement, traffic enforcement, special teams and the budgeting process.

The CPA also provides various "hands-on" demonstrations to enhance your participation in the program. Don a pair of latex gloves and immerse yourself in the world of Crime Scene Processing with our CSI scenario. Suit up and learn the physical dangers and psychological impact of firing your duty weapon utilizing the *Shoot/Don't Shoot* Simmunitions exercises in our *Walk in Our Shoes* scenarios. Find out why we'll provide the chaser if you drink and drive in our D.U.I. Fatal Vision scenarios. All of these exercises, although extremely entertaining, are designed to give you a snapshot of what law enforcement around the country faces every day.

You will have an opportunity to meet and talk with both Sheriff John Hanlin and Chief Jim Burge. Also included in the program is a *Citizen Ride-Along opportunity*, and a field trip to the our range facility, and an chance to participate in our Skid-Car training where you can drive a specially designed patrol car through a course set up at the fairgrounds.

The Citizen's Police Academy is not being held to train citizens as law enforcement personnel or to exercise law enforcement authority of any kind, but rather to assist citizens in gaining an accurate understanding of police practices so that they can make informed judgments about their local law enforcement agencies. Simultaneously, the law enforcement agencies will be able to acquire a greater understanding of the views and concerns of the community through an enhanced relationship with the public.

Monthly Child Safety Seat Clinics

Douglas County area child safety advocates are teaming together to help parents, grandparents and caregivers get 2011 started on the right road to ensure children are traveling safe. The free child safety seat inspection check is the first of many to be offered by the Douglas County Child Safety Seat Coalition every first Friday during the coming year.

Every first Friday of the month, starting in January, certified child safety seat technicians will be on hand at Douglas County Fire District #2 headquarters to check child safety seats. Parents, grandparents and caregivers coming to the clinic must have their children with them to have their child safety seat inspected. If needed, new car seats will be available at a minimal cost for low income families that qualify.

These events are designed to increase awareness and proper use of car seats. When used correctly, car seats are one of the most important child safety tools.

For a child safety seat to do its job correctly, it has to be:

- Appropriate for the child's age and size;
- Installed properly in the vehicle; and
- Adjusted to fit the child securely.

Each car seat check takes approximately 20 minutes. Appointments are requested to ensure that that is adequate time to educate parents and caregivers on the proper fit, offer hands on installation tips and to check for recalls of their child's safety seat. Research shows that seven out of 10 children are improperly restrained. Our number one goal is to make sure all children are properly secured for a safe ride every time they travel in a vehicle.

The free clinics will be offered the first Friday of the month at Douglas County Fire District #2 located at 1290 NE Cedar Street, Roseburg from 9—11 a.m. Our next clinic is scheduled for Friday, February 4.
